### **New Oral Surgery specialist examination**

The Tri-Collegiate Membership in Oral Surgery (MOralSurg) is the existing speciality examination in Oral Surgery. Upon successful completion, candidates may consider sitting the Intercollegiate Speciality Fellowship Examination (ISFE) to attain Fellowship status. The final first sitting of the MOralSurg and ISFE is planned for Spring 2026 and Spring 2028 respectively, with an additional window allocated for re-sits. (see Figure 1)


This is being replaced by a new intercollegiate Dental Speciality Fellowship examination (DSFE), set to commence in Autumn 2026. The DSFE will cover ten dental specialities, including Oral Surgery (F(OS)). To be eligible to sit this exam, candidates must have been awarded MFDS/MFD (see Figure 2). The intention of the DSFE is to ensure an appropriate assessment strategy which aligns with the recently updated GDC curriculum. The curriculum change provided a timely opportunity to revise the examination process.

The structure of the new exam will include a 'Single Best Answers' paper, followed by a 'Clinical Structured Oral' component. Completion of the standardised Fellowship examination will demonstrate satisfactory knowledge for specialist listing, ensuring the highest standards of patient care.


For existing specialists who have passed the MOralSurg exam since January 2020, there is an option to convert their Membership to Fellowship status. This conversion requires payment of an election fee, as well as an increased annual subscription fee. Additional benefits, as outlined on the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh website, include: eligibility to apply for a broader range of fellowships, awards, prizes, lectureships, research opportunities, professorships, and the possibility to undertake more senior roles within the College reserved for Fellows.

However, it's important to note that the postnominals of MOralSurg are deemed equivalent to the F(OS). Therefore, conversion to Fellowship status is optional, and individuals should consider whether this step is necessary for their professional goals.
